Real Charge on Bowlands Head  
for ever for the Poor.

# In the name of God

Item 25. Thomas Holmes of Colyton in the County of Devon M<sup>r</sup>. being Aged and sensible of Mortality doth this ordain my last Will and Testament revoking any other herebefore made. First I commend my Spirit unto God who gave it, and my Body unto Christian burial according to the Direction of our Minister. Item I give and bequeath unto my beloved Grand-daughters Margaret, Katherine, Elizabeth, Joyce and Mary Bunstons, Sixty pounds apiece to be paid to them respectively when they come to the Age of One and twenty years, or at their day of Marriage. Item to my Grand-son Hugh Bunston One hundred pounds, and to John Bunston Sixty pounds, to be paid unto them when they come unto Years of Age. Item to my poor sister Annis Spiller, and to my poor Daughter in Law Mary Stephens two shillings a week apiece during their Naturall Lives to be paid by my Exe<sup>d</sup> whilst they remayne, and after by my heirs hereafter to be named. PROVIDED that my Charity may not be contrabated for and so Received by other hands. In which case I leave my Exe<sup>d</sup> Power to detain this my allowance from them. Item to my Sister Elizabeth Bradstock and Charles her husband, and Charles her son, and Elizabeth her daughter forty pounds to be equally Divided betwixt them. Item to my two sons in Law Mr Thomas Bunston and Mr John Woolcot to by them Rents, and in full satisfaction of my daughters pensions ten shillings apiece. Item to my Nephew John Holmes of Colyton and his heirs forever I give and bequeath the fulling Mill wherein he liveth with all appurtenances and twenty pounds in Money. Item to my Nephew John Curing of Axminster forty shillings. Item to my Niece Mary Holmes and her heirs forever the house adjoyning to my now dwelling house and garden, and twenty pounds in Money. Item to Edward Porter five shillings to be paid with my funerall Expenses. Item to my Niece Elizabeth Sprage I bequeath ten pounds. Item I give and bequeath to the poor of the p<sup>t</sup> of Colyton Three pounds a year forever to be distributed in bread mads of 14 Loaves to the Dozen, that a man and his wife may receive each of them one by the week, so far as they will go, according to the best Distribution of the Distributor. And I appoint my dear wife Mary the first to bear this Office, and after her my Nephew John Holmes during his life, and after him whomsoever my heirs or Exe<sup>d</sup> shall in trust. But my Will is that they do not retain this Office to themselves. And so this my Distributor or Dispensor I allow the surplusage of Eight shillings by the Year for his fees and pains out of the said three pounds. Furthermore for the better security of this my Legacy unto perpetuall, I have enabled and do enable so much as in my lies by this my Will and Testamente. The Feoffees and Twenty Mon<sup>th</sup> or the Overseers of the Poor for the time being to Demand it as a Rent Charge upon Newlands farm as much as if I had made a Good or feoffment of it entiteling them to take a Copie of this my Grant by Will out of the Office of probates, and to keep it in their Chamb<sup>t</sup> amongst their other Records. Item my Will is that my said wife Mary as an addition to her Joynture do enjoy the remaining p<sup>t</sup>fits of the said farm during her life. Item I appoint my dear Grandson Thomas Bunston to be my heir of that and of all the rest of my Estates I shall not before bequeathed, saving only one Gose of free Land called Gattombe, which I give and bequeath unto my beloved Grandson John Woolcot and the heirs of his Body lawfully to be begotten, to him to ten years after my death. But if he chance to die without issue my Will is that the Remainder be to my Grandson Thomas Bunston also. Whereas I have a long term in Buddles says I give and bequeath that also to my Grandson John Woolcot and the heirs of his Body to him to ten years after my death. And if he chance to die without such issue the Remainder to be saved to my Grandson Thomas Bunston in fine. I earnestly entreat my very loving ffriends Mr Peter Carew, Mr Edmond Clode, Mr Bernard Dwight, and my good brother Mr Walter Wye Exe<sup>d</sup> in trust, and allowing some reasonable amounts to themselves for their pains & charges as they think fit between themselves to dispose of all the Overplus of my Estates if there shall be any above what is before bequeathed amongst all my grandchildren share and share alike between them. Excepting that whereas there is a term remaining in Worcombe as a Chattle real p<sup>t</sup> of my Estate. I desire my Exe<sup>d</sup> above named not to touch with that, but suffer my heir and grandson Thomas Bunston to fill up the lives and to take a farther Estate therin to his own benefit as the Lord shall please to favour him in consideration of my great improvement and divers casualties upon the things. PROVIDED notwithstanding that if my Estate fall short in any wise of making good these Legacies which I have bequeathed my afores<sup>d</sup> Grandson and heir Do either ingage for their performance or lose the benefit of this Execution made in his favour. This is my whole Will which I desire may be taken in the plainest sense according to my most apparent intention and according to the utmost favour of the Law, being drawn by the hand of a private friend, and signed by my self, whom it should have no Counsel learned in the Law to advise me. D<sup>r</sup> Wm<sup>t</sup> my hand and seal the eighth Day of June 1670. Thomas Holmes Published.
