Feoffee Chamber Colyton

May 13th 1850

Sir

As Feoffee and Chairman
of a Meeting of the Chamber of
Colyton held this day, I beg to

Feoffee Room. Colyton, 30th July 1850,

Sir, On the part of the Feoffees of Colyton I hasten to thank you, for your letter of the 27th inst. and especially for the amicable tone by which it is chiefly distinguished and the desire it evinces to redress in a manner satisfactory to them the grievances of which they were unwillingly compelled to complain—

Precipitating to the utmost the spirit in which you have written the Feoffees are unwilling you should be put to any expense in the matter if (with due regard to their integrity) the injuries set forth can be remedied in any other way than that costly, tedious and at last unsatisfactory process to which you allude in your letter, and as that expensive step relates only to one of their three grounds of complaint detailed in my letter of the 23 May—viz. the dyke which had been cut, and does not refer to the removal of the turf from another part of the 'Colyton Plot', nor allude to the still greater damage done to that field by the artificial diversion of the current of the Otter (the change in whose course is productive of by far the most injurious consequences to that property and the remedying which would involve heavy outlay to you, the Feoffees request me to suggest for your consideration, that as the mere resilling the trench will not be a compensation for even that section of the damage done in as much as the new soil will sink in the winter, and good pasture cannot be produced for at least three years, the easier mode of adjusting this painful affair to the entire satisfaction of all parties interested, will be, by the exchange of property, they being quite willing to accept any plot in the neighbourhood of Ottery of equal value at per acre A (in weight of soil) to that which is at present a subject of dispute—In the event of this proposal (which is made without prejudice to their case) not being acceded

Fees Chamber Colyton, 23 May 1858

Sir

As Chairman of a Committee appointed by the Feoffees of certain Charity Lands (held for the benefit of the poor of Colyton) to investigate the cause of damage lately done to a portion of their estate adjoining certain lands belonging to you, I am under the painful necessity of calling your attention to the following facts:-

Among other property vested in the Feoffees is a plot of land situated at Alphington-ton in the parish of Ottery which plot is called "Colyton Plot" and is bounded by lands belonging respectively to yourself, Mr Carpenter, Mr Nutt, and Mr Bacon.

Information has reached the Feoffees that the proprietors of these encumbrant premises had agreed between themselves to alter the course of the river Otter at the point where it flows through Mr Carpenter's property before it enters the "Colyton Plot," that such alteration had been made, and that the change thus effected in the course of the stream, had seriously injured the Feoffee land, part of which had been washed away.

A Committee ^{personally} made a ^{personal} visit to the spot and found not only, ^{part} of the nature referred to had been caused by the artificial change of the current, but that additional, and wilful damage had been done by a dyke having been cut on the east side of the boundary walls which divide your land from ours, such dyke having been made to connect two dykes which flow on the North and South sides of your adjoining Meadow. Not only was this mischief done but the soil which was of first rate quality, has been removed and carried off the premises. This dyke is 16 feet long, 16 feet wide, and 5 feet deep, and further damage has been done by the carrying off, of a considerable portion of turf, which had been cut and removed from that part, the "Colyton Plot" lying between the river and your walls.

From a report of the Committee to the Chamber of Feoffees, it was deemed desirable that a deputation of that body should have waited on you, to state their complaint, but your note in reply to our application for such interview, having referred us to Mr Smith, we had a conference with him on these matters on


but the interview with him having been unsatisfactory except in so far as he admitted that the change in the course of the river had been effected in consequence of the orders of the proprietors of the neighbouring lands, we are driven to the unavoidable step of laying a statement of our grievances before yourself, judging that it would be un courteous to resort to other legal proceedings for redress which as the Trustees of a Charity we should be responsible to the Lord Chancellor for not taking until after we had endeavoured to procure from you a compensation for the damages sustained, grievances complained of by us, and an equitable adjustment of the differences consequently now existing between us -
