Copy of Dr. Dangers Report on School.

The Training College
Exeter

14th Dec: 1891

To the Feoffees of Colyton, Devon -
Gentlemen.

The Colyton Grammar School,

At the request conveyed to me through your Bailiff Mr. Edwards, I inspected and examined your school on the 3rd and 4th Inst, during a portion of the time one of your body, Mr. Kingdon, was good enough to be present; I was very glad that he so favoured me, as he was enabled to see for himself how well the boys responded to a very searching *visà voce* examination to which I submitted them while he was with me.

The presence of any representative of a governing body under such circumstances cannot fail to be productive of much good, and my thanks are due to Mr. Kingdon for the interest which he evinced in my work.

I examined every boy in the school in every subject of the syllabus submitted to me, also every note book and every drawing book. I also saw the exercises of those lads who learn drill - and here I would beg leave to note that if you can see your way to do so, it would be an excellent arrangement to have every boy drilled. They have an admirable teacher kindly get firm, and their extension motions accurately performed, were proof that the time devoted to Drill had not been wasted.

The note books were neat, also the drawing books. The note books take the place of the ordinary copy book, the Master thinks that the boys learn to write better according to his method than on the old plan -

The number in attendance (26) is not quite as large as it was a year ago, slight fluctuations must always be expected. The time table was shown to me, the Master states that it has been adhered to most rigorously during the past year. A suitable register of admissions and attendances is duly kept.

The apparatus (books maps &c) seems to be fairly sufficient, and in good order.

As to the Fabric - I observe that very slight repair is needed in the Boys Offices - The Dormitories are very neat and tidy and as well kept as possible.

I will now proceed to deal in detail with the Subjects of study:-

Latin:- The boys in the upper Division had prepared a Book of basar, they translate readily and accurately, and parse well, - a most important point. The Juniors are not advanced, but could write the Latin for easy words.

French:- Translation from French prose, and grammar had been well prepared in the upper class.

Geography:- All boys showed that they had been well taught.

History:- Knowledge of the outlines of English History from the Reign of James I to that of George III, both inclusive satisfactory.

English Grammar:- Parsing good on the whole, analysis very fair.

Reading & Repetition - The passages selected were well known by every boy, reading better than last year on the whole.

Algebra:- Taken by seven boys with good results. Spelling, decidedly good, as a general result - some creditable pieces of composition were submitted for my inspection, which had formed part of the ordinary

School work.

Arithmetic:- Some few papers were good, but this appears to be a weak subject in the lower division especially. The Head Master had informed me, prior to the examination in what classes, corresponding to Government Standards, his boys were worked in Arithmetic, and I gave them printed questions accordingly, but the results were not satisfactory.

But on the whole the School is doing very well, and it may sometimes occur that in one subject, and in none more likely than Arithmetic, there may be an accidental falling off in any particular year.

I think that additional teaching power would remedy this.

It gives me pleasure to state that the boys were exceedingly well behaved, and I had no reason to suppose that any had attempted to take the least unfair advantage at any time during the examination. This, in itself, is a testimonial to the good tone of any school.

In conclusion I have to thank one of your body, the Vicar, for very kind hospitality during my visit, which was made additionally pleasant by the cordial way in which the pupils yielded themselves to my *visâ voce* examination.
