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Whereas in the year 1847 it was deemed desirable to make arrangements for the more readily extinguishing fires which might occur in Colyton; and Whereas a Subscription was accordingly set on foot by the Inhabitants of this town and liberally aided by the various Insurance Companies having Agents here, so that a sum was raised sufficient to procure Two Fire Engines and to build a House in which to keep the said Engines and such other instruments as are needed in time of Fire; - and

Whereas such Engines were accordingly obtained by means of such subscription, and such house built for their safe keeping; and for the purpose of erecting such House as aforesaid it was necessary to purchase, with a portion of the aforesaid Subscription Funds, a plot of land on which such Engine House might be built. and Whereas a plot of land (adjoining the South Western corner of the Church Yard opposite the Vicarage) was accordingly purchased of Mr John Seaward the Vicar of Colyton aforesaid

Shreamston - But it being necessary that this plot of land should be conveyed to some specific person or persons, it was agreed, between the Subscribers, that the said Site should be conveyed to the Feoffees and Twenty Men of the Parish of Colyton to hold for ever, for the Sole and Single Purpose for which the Edifice thereon to be erected should be built, namely for the safe keeping of the Fire Engines and other instruments needed in Time of Fire. Now the Deeds of the Conveyance of the aforesaid Premises (bearing date the Fourth day of May in the Year One Thousand Eight Hundred and Forty Eight Seven) having been this Ninth day of November One Thousand Eight Hundred and Forty Eight delivered up to the Feoffees and Twenty Men of the said Parish of Colyton, in Chamber assembled, for to hold for the objects hereinbefore described; the said Feoffees and Twenty Men hereby accept for themselves and their successors the Trust now reposed in them, and agree to hold the hereinbefore described premises for the Sole & Single Use and Purpose for which such Building has been erected, namely for the safe keeping of the Fire Engines and other implements necessary in time of Fire; and not to permit either the whole or any portion of the said Premises to be diverted from their original use or to be devoted to any other purpose whatsoever than that for which the aforesaid subscribers designed them to be applied, nor to permit them to be rendered in any way useful for the purposes hereinbefore described. and the said Feoffees and Twenty Men further agree both for themselves and their successors to keep the aforesaid Premises constantly in good and sound & perfect repair & condition.

At a meeting of the Tank Committee held this day present, Mr. Snook, Mr. Smith, Mr. Duch, Mr. March and Cap<sup>l</sup> Powell, it was resolved that the following Agreement be entered in the Order Book.

Agreement between The Tank Committee and Hermon Anning (Mason) for the construction of a Tank opposite Mr. Mills house in the town of Colyton.

The said Hermon Anning agrees with the said Committee to dig out, clear away the soil, build the walls of the proposed Tank, the said Tank to be of the dimensions here expressed viz - 10 feet long, 4 feet wide, and 4 feet deep in the clear, the walls of the said Tank to be 1 foot, 6 inches thick, arched over, the said arch not to be less than 9 inches thick, the walls and arch to be composed of Flint stone, Mortar made entirely of Blue sea lime, and River gravel, the walls and arch to be thoroughly grouted as the work proceeds - The said Hermon Anning further agrees and undertakes to place a sufficient railing round the said work to prevent accident to passengers, and also to procure and fix in proper manner a Hatch-way with frame in the said arch, the same to be made of good heart oak with good substantial iron work fitted to the said Hatch with a Fastner, in every respect the same as is at present on the upper large Tank, and lastly the whole, the said Hermon Anning agrees to complete and finish including the payment of Mr. Jn<sup>o</sup> March's charge for a Fire Stone bottom fixed in the said Tank in a proper workman like manner for the sum of Twelve pounds, His witness whereof we have this ~~day~~ Third day of February One thousand eight hundred and forty nine set our hands

1849 March 24th. In compliance with the above recited explanatory notice a Meeting was this day held in Chamber when the Bailiff stated as his reasons for asking for an increase of salary, that he found himself out of pocket in consequence of having held the appointment at the old rate of payment, travelling & other expenses being included in the stipend he received, which stipend would by no means cover the outlays he was compelled to make nor remunerate him for the trouble & loss of time incurred by him in diligently attending to the affairs of the Court, especially so much property formerly and on lease had of late fallen into hand & added to the duties of the Bailiff by demanding increased exertion & sacrifice of time (to the neglect of his own affairs) both in investigating repairs needful to be effected on the property so fallen into hand, & in surveying & letting such premises & collecting the rents thereof; - that, in short, as there was beyond all doubt a considerable addition to his responsibilities & labours, it was but fair there should be an augmentation of salary, in a corresponding ratio; and that he must unavoidably resign his office unless his Salary were raised to such a sum as would in some slight degree recompense him for those personal sacrifices which must inevitably result from his bestowing such vigilant attention on the affairs of the Court as they deserved. The Meeting having acquiesced in the justice of the Bailiff's statement it was moved by Sen Botstone & seconded by Sen Draver "that the Bailiff's Salary for the year ensuing be Twenty Pounds" Carried Unanimously

After a lengthened debate & very mature deliberation it was moved by Sen Kingdon & seconded by Sen Skinner (upon precedent found in page 104 of this volume) that an account of the increase of duty which had devolved on the Bailiff, & in consideration of the satisfactory manner in which he had so faithfully & energetically performed those duties; & further

in consideration of the expenses of that year having pressed so heavily on the Parish's small salary during that period, that the sum of eight Pounds be awarded to Ben Higgins in addition to the amount of his last year's stipend.

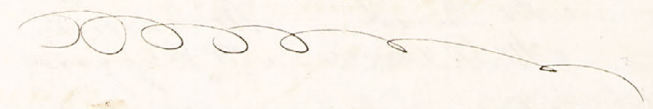

Memorandum Mr Spiller intends Building a Wall in room of a hedge now standing and separating the Feoffe Property from that of Mr Spillers (this Hedge belonging to the said Mr In<sup>r</sup> Spiller) The before named Members of the Chamber are of Opinion that the line shewn and mark'd out for the intended Wall is to the full extent of Mr Spillers Bound And on the event of any Building hereafter being erected on the said intended Wall as far down as the bottom of the garden or otherwise to the spot where the present Privy <sup>now</sup> stands the length being from the Front of the Dwelling House to the bottom of the garden

The Office dropping of any such Building that may hereafter be erected on the said intended Wall cannot be allowed or permitted on this Property belonging to the Feoffes At the same time the above named Members of the Chamber do consider that Mr Spiller is fully entitled to an Office dropping on the Feoffes property should any Building hereafter be erected on a Wall recently built by Mr Spiller from the lower or South side of the present Privy to the Bottom or South end of the Feoffes Nich

1849 August 23<sup>rd</sup> At a Chamber Meeting this Day <sup>the</sup> pursuant to Notice, to take into consideration <sup>the</sup> of enlarging the Tank in the Store Room for the better supply of Water to the Inhabitants.

Resolved that the present Committee Appointed for the Alterations of the Conduit near the South entrance of the Church Yard be further empowered to cause a larger Cistern to be made and placed in the same position as the small one now standing in the Store Room belonging to the Chamber
